To Whom It May Concern,

I am writing this in opposition to the proposed Millennium Pipeline and its inconsistency with the Coastal Zone Management Act.

There is no national interest strong enough to override the deleterious effects this specific pipeline route would have on the coastal environment and on the New York City water supply. Haverstraw Bay, through which the pipeline would cross, has been designated by New York State as a "Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitat." Numerous scientific studies have documented the unique nature of the Bay and the critical role it plays in the Atlantic coast's ecosystem. The Bay is home to the federally listed endangered shortnose sturgeon and has been designated by the National Marine Fisheries Service as and Essential Fish Habitat for numerous other species.

The recommended pipeline route would also include construction activity on pristine water supply lands located in the New Croton Reservoir Watershed. Like all City reservoirs this water is unfiltered before it is consumed by 900,000 persons on an average day. Therefore, watershed protection efforts are the sole practice used to ensure that water quality is maintained at the highest levels. It is crucial that the loading of pollutants into this reservoir be controlled. Millennium's proposal to build its pipeline across a 2.5 mile swath of the Croton watershed will require removal of trees and other vegetation across 20- - 25 acres of watershed lands. In addition to causing the one-time runoff of construction-related pollutants, this substantial loss of vegetation will permanently reduce the watershed's ability to absorb pollutants and prevent contaminants from reaching water bodies.

I believe that the **Bowline Solution** is the right solution for the Millennium Pipeline. Terminating the Millennium Pipeline at the Bowline Facility allows New York to protect the Coastal Zone and enables Columbia Gas to fix the decrepit A-5 line that makes up 222 miles or 52.9% of the pipeline's 420 mile route. This allows Millennium to fulfill its purpose as described to the Federal Energy Regulatory of delivering natural gas to "delivery points in New York

State." The **Bowline Solution** is a viable alternative that allows Millennium to pursue its goals without destroying our environment and endangering our communities

Please consider the following arguments to refute Millennium's claim that [redacted] sites, as suggested by the NYDOS, are not viable.

Millennium, in its initial brief to NOAA of 8/12/02, stated that the alternative specified by NYDOS, to stop its pipeline on the West side of the Hudson River at Bowline, is not economically viable. It said on pg 99 that "building 90% of the pipeline 390 miles to deliver 50% of the pipeline's capacity would not even permit the recovery of costs and thus would never be seriously considered. Nor is there any reasonable or environmentally preferable alternative means of transporting the gas from Bowline to New York City."

In contrast to these statements, consider the following:

1) The Millennium Pipeline will replace 220 miles of existing 50 year old pipeline, the A5 pipeline, owned by Millennium's parent company/partner, that is corroded and lacks reliability. Therefore, replacing this pipeline needs to be considered routine maintenance that Millennium/Columbia would have to perform and pay for, in any event, to keep its existing customers. In fact, this replacement is so economically viable that Columbia built 10.9 miles of recent pipeline in the early 1990's at Ramapo to the Bowline Generating Station to service its customer there (pg 6-7, Millennium initial brief to [redacted] before the existence of the Millennium Pipeline proposal.

2) Bowline is the site of newly proposed electric generation plants. Is it not conceivable that much of the 350,000 dekatherms of extra gas Millennium proposed to deliver east of the Hudson could be used at Bowline to generate [redacted] of electricity destined for consumption in the NYC area? [redacted] nuclear electric generation facility, approximately 5 miles away [redacted] is under fierce pressure to close in view of post 9-11 safety [redacted] it inconceivable that the same 350,000 dekatherms of natural gas [redacted] natively used to convert its generation of 2000 megawatts of [redacted] ic production?(This conversion could conceivably be needed for [redacted] ty concerns.)

With regard to Millennium claiming that the DOS alternative to utilize the Algonquin Pipeline is not viable, let me point out that FERC in the FEIS pg 3-37 concluded that this connection would require upgrades of the Algonquin and further connection to the Iroquois pipeline. The Iroquois system would utilize the Eastchester Expansion Pipeline to get the gas to the same terminus as Millennium at Hunts point, Bronx. FERC said the "costs", compared to Millennium's "might make this alternative unviable. However, FERC overestimated the cost of this proposal since it erroneously added the cost (\$174 million) of the already approved Eastchester Expansion Pipeline, and failed to add the reported \$100 million that will be paid by Millennium to create the Bronx portion of the Millennium Pipeline to Hunt's Point from Mt Vernon, NY.

With regard to Millennium claiming that there are no other Hudson river crossing alternatives, much of its arguments relate to inadequate staging areas available for these alternative crossings. But, consider this:

1) The Algonquin Pipeline is made up of two side by side pipelines. There was adequate staging area for this pipeline company to put not only one pipeline but two pipelines across the Hudson River at this point. Entergy, ~~the company that~~ currently owns the Indian Point Nuclear facility, where ~~the generators~~ are located, had recently proposed to build peak natural gas peaking generators just to the South of the Algonquin Pipelines. There is adequate space there for Millennium's pipeline, if the space is adequate to the North.

2) The Tennessee pipeline crosses the Hudson River South of Piermont NY. It too is a two pipeline crossing. Not only was adequate staging area available there for both of these pipelines to cross, but the El Paso ConneXion Project, one of the multiple pipeline projects that would obviate the need for Millennium's pipeline, is proposed to also pass into the Hudson there. El Paso have indicated staging is not a problem.

The above emphasizes Millennium's deception in many of its arguments to the DOC, or how little homework and thought Millennium put into its Hudson River crossing alternatives, and why the NYDOS was right in finding Millennium's proposal to be inconsistent with the CZMP.

At the DOC hearing on 11/13/02, I was struck by several speakers from Irvington, New York. Aside from the fact these individuals could lose their electricity or water supply (an accident or terrorist strike to the Millennium Pipeline next to the Con Edison high voltage power corridor, or secondly to the Catskill Aqueduct, would cause Irvington in the Coastal Zone to lose all electricity and 40% of the NYC's supply , or respectively all water supply and 40% of the supply to NYC) , they spoke of the threat to their homes, having just been informed that the Millennium pipeline would be going there.

They are not on the pipeline route so why were these people just getting Emails informing them of this possibility as late as 5:30 AM on the date of the hearing.

It seems that Millennium had just met with officials and leaders in the community of Irvington to scare these citizens; they are reported as saying that if the pipeline route is altered, it will be going through Irvington. One can only guess why Millennium would chose to do this at this time since pipeline companies are not usually the ones to try to scare residents about pipelines along a potential route.

Several interesting conclusions can be made by Millennium's actions:

1) By frightening these Irvington residents without formally studying this Irvington alternative, Millennium underscores that they think that this is a very viable Alternative.

In spite of Millennium's assertion that there are no other Alternative routes that would minimize or eliminate the serious effects on the CZMP, there are many such alternatives that Millennium chose not to investigate, as the NYDOS brief indicates.

2) By scaring residents in this way, Millennium also acknowledges that such a high pressure natural gas pipeline is a serious safety concern; it can't be allowed to seriously argue to the DOC that it is not a safety concern to the present route next to water aqueducts, high voltage electric corridors or schools, but it is to local residents of Irvington.

3) This is another example of a pattern of deception and unscrupulous behavior on the part of Millennium. Add this to the busing in of union workers from hundreds of miles away to yell epithets at Westchester's citizenry concerned about the harmful affects of this pipeline project at the recent DOC hearing.

Thus Millennium's tricks and arguments put forth in their legal challenge of the NYDOS lack of consistency determination should be deeply suspect.

As a resident of Nyack, New York (in Rockland County), I am writing to voice my strong opposition to the fast-tracked plans to send the Millennium Pipeline down the Palisades, and through Hook Mountain or Tallman Mountain State Parks. I am deeply offended by what I consider to be a complete lack of due process - having only just heard about the plans this week and having heard that our deadline for public comment is December 2.

This project has the potential to completely disturb the sensitive eco-systems in this area, as well as bring great upheaval and wasteful expense to the people of this region. We have already sustained years of road construction along the Palisades Parkway and Rte. 9W - projects which have only just recently been completed. As a resident of Croton-on-Hudson concerned with my family's safety and health, I feel that the Millennium pipeline should not be built.

The pipeline will result in severe and irreversible degradation of the wetlands and other natural resources of the Croton Arboretum. Tree removal will disrupt runoff and stream flow, increase erosion, change downstream hydrologic conditions, and subject the wetlands to increased sunlight and wind. Such damage could permanently impair nearly a quarter of the Arboretum's land, harm the sensitive wetland, vegetation, and wildlife in the area, and destroy the scenic and recreational value of the Arboretum.

The Pipeline greatly exacerbates the terrorism and evacuation concerns converging around Indian Point. The Pipeline would run adjacent to and cross several roads and two major arteries - the Taconic State Parkway and Route 9 - comprising part of the Indian Point evacuation-road system. An accident or attack during the Pipeline's construction, or intentional sabotage thereafter, could cripple these vital components of the REPP and thereby isolate thousands of coastal-zone residents from their only escape during a nuclear emergency.

Millennium has undertaken no site-specific studies of the Croton Wellfield area. After construction, the continued presence of the pipeline in the Wellfield would present an ongoing risk to the Village's water quality. A pipeline leak would introduce contaminants into the ground water. Natural gas can dissolve in and be transported by ground water.

information has not been made readily available to citizens of the county. A minimum need is that the comment period must be extended and public awareness vastly increased.

Obviously with so little information I am not in a position to critique the

proposals. Reported plans to route the pipeline along the Palisades Parkway and/or through Tallman Mountain State Park and Piermont Marsh would

be unacceptable.

I suspect that something is being hidden or a proposal bulldozed through. My fellow citizens of the county and I demand more information.

I am writing to encourage your support in upholding the FERC's finding that the Millennium Pipeline Project is in the Public Interest.

I manage power plants in rural upstate New York. The Indeck-Olean facility is located in Cattaraugus County, Olean, New York; one of the Counties that the proposed line is scheduled to be constructed through. The construction of this line is important to the future viability of Indeck's Olean Plant, and to the Southern Tier Region of Western, NY generally. Indeck-Olean is a state-of-the-art design with very low NOx and CO emissions.
