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

Dear Ms. Salas:

I strongly urge the Commission to reject the Broadwater proposal of Shell and Trans-Canada. A floating terminal for liquefied natural gas in Long Island Sound is a terrible idea. Placing such an industrial site in the midst of the Sound would inflict an eyesore blot on one of this country's loveliest natural bodies of water and impose intrusive restrictions on boating. The huge barges needed to transport the liquefied natural gas through the Sound to the terminal would pose an additional hazard for boaters. Broadwater would also endanger the health and safety of citizens by placing hazardous chemicals in the midst of a prime boating and shipping area, where it would predictably become a prime target for terrorist attacks. There can, in any case, be no justification for closing off a sizeable portion of a public waterway for use by a private, profit-making venture such as Broadwater.
